Read the scenario together. Use what you learned about consent in Part A to plan a skit to present to your classmates. Show a realistic and healthy response to the situation.

Can I Give You a Hug?

Your friend looks sad and you want to give them a hug.

What do you say first? What do you do if they say “no”?

Plan your skit below:

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Taking a Picture

You want to take a selfie with your friend.

What do you say before taking it? What if they say “not right now”?

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Borrowing Supplies

You need a pencil and see one on your classmate's desk.

What should you say before taking it? What do you do if they say “I need it”?

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Changing the Game

You're playing a group game and want to change the rules.

How do you check if everyone agrees? What if someone doesn't agree?

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Sitting Together

You want to sit beside someone at lunch.

What do you say before sitting down? What do you do if they say they want to be alone?

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Kissing at a Party

Two people like each other. One of them leans in to kiss the other person.

What should they say or do before going any further? What happens if the other person says no or pulls away?

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Holding Hands

You're hanging out with someone you like. You want to hold their hand.

How do you ask? What if they pull their hand away?

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Someone Changes Their Mind

Two people were cuddling and agreed to kiss. One person suddenly feels uncomfortable.

How can they let the other person know they want to stop? What should the other person do?

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Feeling Pressured

One person keeps asking the other for a kiss or to go somewhere private. The other person keeps saying “maybe later” or “I’m not sure.”

What should the person who asked do? How can they respect the other person’s feelings?

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Sharing Photos

Someone sends an intimate photo to someone they trust. Later, the person who got the photo thinks about showing it to others.

Is this okay? What is consent in this situation?
